

Comments and Questions on proposed JSDF Project

1. Training of 100 FA staff under the Component A is overlapping with CF Training activity of CBFS Phase 2. Further coordination is required for effective implementation of the both projects.
2. Regularly, WB or implementing partner should consult JICA experts who are working for CBFS Phase 2 in order to preventing overlapping and better coordination and success for both projects in terms of following points.
 - a) The 1st risk mentioned in the application (D2), delay of "CF zoning", is expected to be solved earlier through capacity building on Division level FMP formulation, one of the components of CBFS Phase 2.
 - b) CBFS Phase 2 could facilitate the Component B by giving priority on training of FA local staff in the selected 5 Cantonments, while CBFS Phase 2 also could utilize the Outputs of the Component B to improve CF training at FWTC.
 - c) If the training under the Component A is conducted by FWTC, both CBFS and the JSDF project could develop training materials and trainer resources each other that will be resulted in not only effective implementation of the both projects but also improving sustainability of management of FWTC.
3. Since CFAC/CFI is not the only major NGO supporting CF in Cambodia, full support of all the other key NGOs on this JSDF project should be well confirmed for success implementation.
4. Coordination with the new multi donor local community support project recently proposed by DANIDA and DFID should be well considered, since CF is a part of commune base natural resource management.
5. Could you break down Services, Training and Subgrants costs mentioned in the application (Grant Categories) although those costs are explained in the application (component A to C)?
6. How will staffs of implementing partner receive salary? Does JSDF cover their salary also?
7. In terms of budget size(around US\$ 2 Million) and capacity of implementing partner(around 5 to 6 staffs excluding Rattanakiri), more staff posting should be considered in order to better operating and management.
